Comment: The year to year of Part B Eligible, Continued in Part C went from 361 in FFY22 to 619 in FFY23 which is a 72% increase. This is due to FFY23 being the first full year of implementation with an approved policy on file with OSEP. With this change during FFY22 the state worked on promoting the option for families and the increase is a direct result of this. The increase aligns with what Connecticut forecasted the summer extension numbers to be when working to create a policy so we believe this will level off in the next reporting periods. There was an increase across race/ethnicity particularly regarding those who identified as African American (27% increase), Hispanic/Latino (26% increase), and Native Hawaiian or Other Pacific Islander (27%). A significant increase was expected as, Connecticut reported an increase in referrals across almost all race/ethnicities in the last few years. Of the race/ethnicities African American and Hispanic/Latino are historically one of the larger sub populations that CT Birth to Three supports. With this, we would expect to see a larger percentage increase. The Lead Agency has also worked to create targeted trainings and build a strong professional development team to support service coordinators. Strong providers and opportunity for learning and growth means families are more likely to have complete IFSP outcomes prior to age three, which explains the increase we are seeing and will continue to see as we strengthen those relationships.
