Meeting called to order at 9:15 AM

Cindy Jackson, ICC Chair, provided opening remarks for the family focus meeting. She stated that is provides an opportunity for families to share their stories either through speaking or through letters. She thanked Lisa Oper for organizing family input.

Commissioner Byes and Deputy Commissioner Trueworthy both spoke welcoming families.

Public Comment:

Susan C. of Lumility – KIDSTEPS: Discussed connection between stories shared by families with challenges in consistency in staff/providers with what is happening within programs. Discussed the need for supporting the workforce from the Lead Agency and OEC. She stated without the support it is providing challenges in supporting families and providing consistent service. She reported that KIDSTEPS gave 13 offers to speech therapists who declined the position due to salary and cannot continue to support families without a rate increase. She stated that the rates are impacting the workforce which is impacting families.

Old Business:

Legislative/Fiscal: Reported that they have been active and meeting one on one with legislators. They have presented in front of legislative committees. Providers and committee members have been going out within the community and within town hall meetings. They have been discussing and advocating for funding for Birth to Three and GAP and the need for a rate change.

System Support/Professional Development: Reported that they had no updates since last meeting.

Communication/Education & Outreach: Reported that they had no updates since the last meeting apart from meeting with families to prepare for today's Family Focused meeting.

211 Advisory: Cindy advised the Lead Agency on the process and families who want or do not want a specific program. Parents are not able to make a request for a program, and that this is taking unnecessary time on the provider's part to then transfer to the program the parent wanted in the first place. ICC is in support of the advisory committee to continue and to be an ad hoc committee for the 211-intake process for families.

New Business:

Families presented their stories and perspectives on their time in Birth to Three during the meeting. Four families were in person, one video was sent in, there were 2 virtual parents, and 11 letters were sent in and read by the ICC parent representatives.

Leona Adamczyk, co-chair of the ICC spoke about her Birth to Three story as well as her advocacy work and work on the ICC. She will be attending one last meeting and then focusing her attentions on her CPAC role.

State Systemic Improvement Plan (SSIP)

Parents will be able to describe their child's abilities and challenges more effectively as a result of their participation in Early Intervention.

FFY20-25 SPP / APR SSIP

- The week of clarification has begun and concluded. The Lead Agency has revised Indicators 7 and 8C to clarify noncompliance reporting in FFY2022. Furthermore, the Lead Agency modified the introduction and SSIP.
 - The final report is posted here: [Annual Performance Reports - Birth23.org](#).
 - The Interagency Coordinating Council (ICC) Public Reporting tables are attached below.
- What happens next?
 - The Lead Agency expects our federal determination to be issued on **June 15, 2025**.
 - Determinations will be sent to programs over the summer of 2025.
 - The Lead Agency will begin discussions on the next SPP/APR package within the next year. This will include potential updates to the State identified Measurable Result (SiMR), SSIP, and other reporting requirements (state targets, SSIP, etc.).

Fiscal Enhancements

- Each year, Connecticut submits an application to the US Department of Education (ED) Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) for about \$4.8M in funding to support the administration of Part C of the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA Part C).

Personnel Development

- Early Intervention Specialist (EIS) credentialing opportunities are ongoing, with an additional proctored exam that occurred in April. Several candidates have successfully passed portions of the exam, demonstrating their excellence in implementing family-centered practices. Efforts are still underway to develop a training framework and provide guidance for observers.
- In late March, training modules hosted by DPH encountered some technical difficulties. However, two programs have kindly partnered to pilot the OEC's Initial Certificate and Service Coordination modules, supported in Protraxx, with positive results. This initiative will allow us to consolidate staff training in one location and streamline the prerequisite process for service coordination.
- The lead agency has issued support for student placement reimbursements for the Fall to participating programs.

General Supervision

- Determination Report of Outcomes and Program Priorities (DROPP) report update:
 - For the coming year, we are focusing primarily on federally required measures (SPP/APR) and using data that the Lead Agency has collected in the state data system (SPIDER) verified through the Lead Agency typical verification process.
- We received our notice from the Federal Office of Special Education Programs (OSEP) outlining that Connecticut's Differentiated Monitoring System (DMS) 2.0 site visit will occur between **August 2027 and January 2028**. This visit will include a discovery, engagement, and close-out phase. The Lead Agency continues to prepare for this visit.
- The Central Billing Office Request for Proposals (RFP) has been scored, and the awardee has been notified. We expect contract discussions with the awardee to be forthcoming.

What do we report out on the family survey?


Indicator 4 of the SPP/APR focuses on the percent of families participating in Part C who report that early intervention services have helped the family:

For FY 2023 the Birth to Three System in the State of Connecticut met the target for indicator 4A, but did not meet the targets for indicator 4B or 4C.



* Important Note - Connecticut's family survey population size took a dip during reporting for FY 2019 (7/1/18-6/30/19). These surveys were distributed during spring 2020 and the results need to be interpreted with a Covid-19 lens. We are currently trending towards pre pandemic numbers for survey completion.

Executive Summary:

This quarter, CPAC received 83 referrals to the Family Connections Program, with 72 families accepting services. We were unable to reach five families and are making a third contact attempt with six others. Currently, 19 parents are receiving support from trained parent mentors. We also welcomed Maria Doulas, a new parent mentor completing her practicum with CPAC. Maria Daulas, a Birth to Three parent and graduate of the SEAT® program — a year-long special education advocacy training developed in partnership with COPAA — is now supporting eight families and has been a valuable addition to our team. Technical assistance provided by our Early Childhood Consultants is summarized in the table below. In addition, CPAC has supported Birth to Three professionals with questions about PPT2, referrals for intensive family supports through the PreK Pathfinder Program, and training coordination. Lisa Operp will continue to lead CPAC's involvement in SPDG Goal 3, with Adriana Fontaine participating as needed. SPDG Goal 3, which main focus is to strengthen the transition process for children and their parents transitioning from Birth to Three to Preschool Special Education. CPAC's related objectives to this work is to help parents better understand how IFSP relates to IEP, Provide interpreters/transition facilitators for non-English speaking families during the Birth to Three to PreK transition with parents who are knowledgeable of the special education process.

Executive Summaries Previous Quarters

Executive Summary Q2:

We received 65 referrals to the Family Connections Program during this quarter, 59 families accepted services. We were unable to contact four families, we are on our third attempt to contact five families, and one family declined services. After our third attempt, our intake coordinator sends out an email to the families highlighting the program's benefits and how to access services. Eleven families are currently receiving support from a parent mentor. One of our bilingual parent consultants established a collaboration with Fairhaven Community Health Center, pediatric Development and Pediatric Autism Clinic and she has been receiving referrals to CPAC for families of young children 0-5, she is referring those families under 3 to Family Connections and for B23 transition support. We expect that this partnership will also increase the number of referrals to Family Connections Program and TA support from our Early Childhood Consultants for Birth to Three transition related questions. Our Early Childhood Team Leader, Lisa Opert has been participating in CT Inclusion Planning team and our Program Manager has attended relevant professional development sessions such as: "Supporting Families Experiencing House Insecurity and Its Impact on Young Children" and "Using Functional Behavioral Assessments to create Supportive Learning." In the upcoming months, we will be revising our Early Childhood training sessions and discussing next steps to bring these trainings to families of young children.

Executive Summary Q4

CPAC received a total of 69 referrals during this quarter. Referrals for monolingual (Spanish/Other) remains low. Our Early Childhood Parent Consultants provided support as described in the Technical Assistance table, contacting the families 81 times. 48 families accepted services, seven we were unable to contact, and we are still trying to reach fourteen families. One of the highlights during this quarter is the engagement levels on Facebook. We have 700 families on Family Connections Support Group on Facebook, families are connecting with each other through

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posts and sharing Early Childhood development information, events and questions about specific situations. We created a chat for “transition questions” and is very active with 20 members participating. Our Early Childhood Manager attended the Inclusion Institute and some of the sessions included: Every Child Can Fly: Elements of High-Quality Inclusive Learning Environments, and Inclusion Stories: Using Storytelling Podcasts to Change Mindsets Toward Inclusive Education. Our Parent Consultant Lisa Opert was invited to participate in a Family Pannel at the Inclusion Institute where she shared her experiences and about raising a young child with developmental delays and her experiences in Early Intervention. She will be participating in CT Equity Cohort through North Carolina Early Learning.

Executive Summary Q3:

Referrals to the Family Connections Program increased by 86%. We received 96 referrals compared to 52 in the previous reporting period. Out of those 96 referrals, 54 families accepted services, 7 families were matched with a parent mentor. Our Early Childhood team provided one to one support to 16 families regarding transition from Birth to Three into Pre-K Special education, this topic continues to be the most important. We explained the differences between medical model vs. educational model as this seems to be a gray area for families and many families of young children with ASD are choosing ABA therapeutic placement over Pre-K Special Education. Other relevant topics included: preparing for your child’s Birth to Three Transition Conference, understanding the IFSP, partnering with your child’s assessment team and we helped families prepare for PPT1. We conducted 6 virtual events for families, and childcare providers i.e., Child Find in CT: how to talk to families when concerns arise? Transitioning Your Child with Autism into Pre-K Special Education. We continue to host our monthly Backpack Series which covers social emotional development, and we continue to have our weekly support group.

Executive Summary Q2:

During this quarter we received 52 referrals and provided support to 34 families. Our Early Childhood team provided one to one support regarding transition to 12 families, this continues to be the most important topic for families. We also supported families to understand their IFSP. We are offering the Sparkler APP to families enrolled in Birth to Three. Through this APP we are able to offer coaching advice and over 1,500 of off-screen play activities and games that might reinforce EI services and provide ideas to engage with their children.

Executive Summary Q1:

During this quarter, we received sixty-two referrals to Family Connections, and seven parents requested a mentor, and they are currently matched with a parent mentor. The Early Childhood team focused on providing support to these families, contacting them on 84 occasions to discuss the topics highlighted below. The team focused on several activities, such as creating our [Family Connections Website](#), which includes

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Development Information and Resources, Transition from Birth to Three, Communicating Needs to professionals, Parent Mentor Portal, and Training Resources; please note that the match request forms and parent mentor application are currently being translated into Portuguese, and these items will be uploaded next week. Additionally, our manager attended the aRPY Meeting in Atlanta June 22-23, an event organized by Parent to Parent of Georgia to conduct activities related to the aRPY Ambassador Project through a subcontract with the Early Childhood Technical Assistance (ECTA) Center at UNC-Chapel Hill. In this event, we presented a workshop regarding Birth to Three's partnership with CT's PTI, Family Connections Program, and how to help families create a parent statement for their IFSP/IEP meetings via Google docs and using personas to describe their child's unique needs to EI professionals and School Personnel. Additionally, we attended OSEP Leadership and Project Directors' Conference 2022 for sessions related to Early Childhood: Reimagine Early Childhood Transitions—Focus on the Family's Vision: What Every Policy Maker, Leader, and Practitioner Needs to Know and IDEA Part C Extension Option-Providing Choices for Early Childhood Transition. Finally, we have been invited to participate in the 2022 virtual advisory board meeting for the project, *Bridging the Gap*, headed by Dr. Thyde Dumont-Mathieu, a developmental-behavioral pediatrician at Connecticut Children's. The main goals of this project are to improve outcomes for all children at risk of having developmental disorders, including ASD, and to identify and serve children of color by eliminating racial/ethnic disparities in the early identification of and early intervention for children at-risk.
