
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

Connecticut's Birth to Three system remains dedicated to the optimal development of infants and toddlers. Early identification and supporting families who have children with a diagnosis that has a high likelihood of developmental delay or children who have a developmental delay of -2 SD in one area or -1.5 in two of the five areas of development is one of the most important priorities. The charts below show the percent of children with IFSP's in Connecticut on 12/1 compared to the national average, broken out by 0-1 and 0-3.



Where are the supports provided?

Each provider who supports families throughout the State of Connecticut are dedicated professionals who provide Early Intervention in the home or community setting where children without disabilities typically participate. In FY19, 100% of the children received supports in their home or community setting. This is essential in providing parents the support they need to advocate for their child and describe their child's needs. Evidence-based practices within an activity-based teaming are imperative. Best practice should be to provide supports in those familiar places where the family spends their time. Supports in the natural learning environment offers unique opportunities for the Early Interventionist to support the family in their Natural Learning Environment.




The top ten discipline types on FY19 IFSPs outlined below:


Quality Practices Self-Assessment (QPSA)

In the summer of 2019, Connecticut collected new data using a Quality Practices Self-Assessment (QPSA). 740 practitioners completed the selfassessment representing each discipline working in Connecticut's Birth to Three System. Preliminary results indicated that those who have completed the training provided by Rush and Shelden and received coaching rated themselves across the practices at a much higher rate than those who did not go through the training.

Of those who participated in the survey, 163 attended Rush and Shelden's two-day training, and 610 did not participate in the training.



Of those who participated in the survey, 30 attended Rush and Shelden's master coach training, and 743 did not participate the training.





Birth Cohort Data

Birth cohort data looks at data for all children born during a given calendar year. It provides insight into how early intervention touches the lives of 13% of the families in Connecticut. This report reflects the 2015 birth cohort or all children born between 1/1/15 and 12/31/15 who turned three in the calendar year 2018.



In FY19, eligibility evaluations were completed for 9977 children, and the families of 6796 were determined eligible for Birth to Three supports. Over the last ten years, evaluation and eligible children have increased.





Average Number of Hours per Month Listed on the IFSP

The families of 652 children were eligible for Birth to Three supports based on a diagnosis. The top ten diagnosis being:

23% Prematurity

18% Brain and spinal cord injuries and malformations

13% Autism

12% Deafness/Hard of Hearing

11% Speech Sound Disorders/Childhood Apraxia

11% Chromosomal Variations such as Down Syndrome

9% Neonatal Abstinence Syndrome/Fetal Alcohol Syndrome

3% Cleft Palate

1% High Lead Levels





FY19 was the first full fiscal year of fiscal reporting in the new payment structure. During FY18, the system moved to a fee-for-service payment model, which led to some structural changes. During FY19, the system went out for a request for proposals (RFP) and resulted in a reduction of programs as many programs increased their capacity to support families in new towns.

Town-by-Town Data

The table below shows a town-by-town breakdown of children who received supports throughout FY19. This breakdown represents any child who received a service at any point throughout FY19, and the last column represents the 2015 birth cohort. Suppressed data provided for towns with five or fewer children to protect confidentiality. Birth to Three has collaborated with the CT Data Collaborative, and additional data is located on <u>ctdata.org</u>

Note: Children can be referred at birth and remain in the system until age three. Therefore, the number of eligible children and IFSP can be larger than children referred to Birth to Three in the fiscal year.
